#### February is Black History Month

Black History Month is an annual observance to celebrate the achievements and experiences of Black people within the United States. Black History Month focuses on Blackness and recognizes what it means to be Black in America, reminding us of the contributions and pivotal roles Black Americans have held within the history of the United States. In 1915, the 50th anniversary of the 13th Amendment that abolished slavery, a three week celebration was held that included research into and promotion of achievements by Black Americans and people of African descent. The first Negro History and Literature Week was celebrated in 1924. Black History Month began in 1970 at Kent State. Black History Month was institutionalized as a national observance starting in 1976, and since every U.S. president has designated February as Black History Month. While one month will never be enough to honor, celebrate and learn about the generations of Black people who were forced into slavery, and who have had to fight for rights every moment of their lives; we ask you to take some time to educate yourself this month. We believe this is a good place to begin building your understanding and learn a new perspective which can offer you an opportunity to be a better ancestor, better ally and better community member Learn more about Black History Month here and here.

### EDI Resource Guide Available Now!


